Make a bouncy egg! (With adult supervision)


Here's how to do it.....

1. Get a raw egg and carefully place into a glass jar.
  2. Fill the glass with white vinegar until the egg is completely submerged.
  3. Leave the egg in the glass for 1-3 days.
  4. Remove the egg from the glass and rinse it under some tap water.
- (Watch out they are delicate and will break if dropped!)

## Geographers – An Easter Geo-Cache in your Garden or House!

1. Make a treasure map. Divide it up into squares using a ruler and pencil.
2. Place a simple grid co-ordinate system on your map eg A1, B4, D3 etc.. (get parents/carers to help with this)
3. Decide which co-ordinates on your map you're going to use to place treasure (could be mini eggs, Easter related, pencils etc).
4. Using separate pieces of paper and your co-ordinate system, write little notes for each point eg Well done, you've made it **and** to write down the next co-ordinate. By doing this, it will move your family member onto the next point. Very important.
5. Now go and set out your course, placing the treasure by using your co-ordinates. Remember to leave the notes!
6. Once set up, try it out. Remember to take your map. If you have missed a co-ordinate or some treasure re-set and try again.
7. You should make your last co-ordinate a return to the start.
